

LeVyen Pham

2025 SOUTHERN MISS MEDALLION RECIPIENT



LEUYEN PHAM is the Caldecott Honor-winning illustrator of Bear Came Along by Richard Morris, but you've likely seen her warm, memorable character designs in a variety of different titles. Pham illustrated Julianne Moore's picture book series Freckleface Strawberry, and frequently works with author Shannon Hale to create series like Princess in Black and Itty-Bitty-Kitty-Corn. In addition to illustration, Pham also writes her own stories. She's the author and illustrator of Big Sister, Little Sister, There's No Such Thing as Little, A Piece of Cake, All the Things I Love About You, The Bear Who Wasn't There, and Outside, Inside. Recently, Pham teamed up with another Southern Miss Medallion winner, Gene Luen Yang (2023) to create Lunar New Year Love Story.

Though born in Vietnam, Pham grew up in California and fell in love with drawing, despite her parents' desire for her to pursue other career paths. After earning a degree at the Art Center College of Design in Pasadena, California, Pham worked for DreamWorks Feature Animation before pivoting to the world of children's literature full-time.

Pham lives in Los Angeles with her family, continuing to create the vivid characters we know and love. Pham's work deals with many different topics - from the pain of not fitting in in *ltty-Bitty-Kitty-Corn* to the distress of the pandemic in *Outside*, *Inside*, to shifting family dynamics in *Big Sister*, *Little Sister* - but her characters share one important trait. They're all inviting, asking the reader to stop a moment and enjoy the story that's about to unfold. We're excited to welcome Pham to USM this spring and celebrate her career in children's literature!

2025 KEYNOTE SPEAKERS



KATE LETH

Canadian artist Kate Leth wears many hats - they're an author, a cartoonist, designer, having worked for companies ranging from Marvel to KaBoom! and Hasbro. Leth has written graphic novels in the *Adventure Time* series (based on the animated series of the same name), penned Marvel's *Patsy Walker: AKA Hellcat* series, and created *Spell on Wheels* from Dark Horse. They've also shared their personal experiences with gender identity, relationships, and life in general in webcomics like *Valley Ghouls* and on their social media.

In addition to working in animation and comics, Leth has designed art for writers like Cassandra Clare and Holly Black, as well as the podcasts *Welcome to Night Vale* and *The Adventure Zone*. Of course, Leth also has a rad line of t-shirts, pins, and prints in their personal shop, too!

Leth most recently published *Mall Goth*, the story of teenager Liv Holme, who struggles to stay true to herself while navigating intense interpersonal relationships at her new school. *Mall Goth* is a Y2K tale of identity and self-acceptance that resonates with both teens and adults.



SUSAN CAMPBELL BARTOLETTI

had no clue she wanted to be an author as a child, but she soon realized that all she wanted to do was write. As she progressed through school, Bartoletti realized she had a passion for research, but she still didn't pursue a career as a writer. Instead, she taught eighth-grade English for years, eventually joining a writer's group after seeing her students nurture their own love of creative writing.

Since making the leap to writing full-time, Bartoletti has written nonfiction, picture books, and fiction. Her award-winning nonfiction for young people conveys the harsh truths of

historical events in a way that is simultaneously age appropriate and truthful. She's covered topics like World War II (*Hitler Youth: Growing Up in Hitler's Shadow*), the Irish potato famine (*Black Potatoes*), the history of the Ku Klux Klan (*They Called Themselves the KKK*), and typhoid fever (*Terrible Typhoid Mary*). Bartoletti's fictional novels also show her love of research and historical accuracy. *The Boy Who Dared* expands on a real-life tale mentioned in *Hitler Youth*, while entries in the *Dear America* series look at the lives of kids during the 1800s. No matter what topic she's covering, Bartoletti brings a humanizing look to the subject matter, examining why people sometimes do bad things out of fear or ignorance.

COLEEN SALLEY STORYTELLING AWARD RECIPIENT



JOS N. HOLMAN

is a traditional storyteller, encouraging listeners to participate in his presentations and feel like they're part of the tales. He specializes in multicultural folktales, as well as introducing poetry and nursery rhymes to young people. Holman formerly worked as a children's librarian, where he honed his craft, and he still enjoys participating in summer reading programs today. In addition to his storytelling performances, Holman also leads Reader's Theatre presentations with students and helps others find their storytelling voice.

Holman has served as librarian at the Tippecanoe County Public Library in Indiana for 21 years, working to provide access to stories for all young people. He has also taken his passion for storytelling online, sharing Black History Month presentations, poems, and other stories on Instagram.

So much of Holman's work focuses on giving back to his community through storytelling and celebrating the rich history and folklore of the art.



THE COLEEN SALLEY STORYTELLING AWARD

The Coleen Salley Storytelling Award was established to honor the memory of Children's Book Festival supporter, storyteller and children's literature advocate Coleen Salley. Throughout her career and life, Ms. Salley worked tirelessly to promote quality children's literature. Each year, the award recognizes a storyteller whose mission reflects the ideals and dedication to the field that Ms. Salley personified. JAMIE C. NAIDOO

is the Director and Foster-EBSCO Endowed Professor at The University of Alabama School of Library and Information Studies. His scholarly research includes topics like library services to diverse populations and diversity in children's and YA media. He teaches a wide range of courses in public librarianship, children's literature, and storytelling. Naidoo often consults

with organizations (both non-profit and for-profit) that focus on developing children's media and educational curricula. In addition to the many scholarly articles and reference texts he's worked on, Naidoo has written two books, *Diversity Programming for Digital Youth* and *Rainbow Family Collections: Selecting and Using Children's Books with LGBTQ Content*, both of which offer practical advice to librarians on how to develop their library's collections.

Naidoo has earned a variety of awards for his work in library and information science, and we can't wait to welcome him to the festival!

DE GRUMMOND CHILDREN'S LITERATURE LECTURER



WILL HILLENBRAND

is a celebrated author and illustrator whose works include eighty picture books for young readers. In addition to his own self-illustrated titles, he has also illustrated the works of writers and retellers, including Verna Aardema, Judy Sierra, Margery Cuyler, Judith St. George, Phyllis Root, Jane Yolen, Karma Wilson and Jane Hillenbrand.

About his book *The Voice In The Hollow*, School Library Journal said: 'There's not a word out of place in this blustery adventure. It's a masterful

collaboration of illustration and text. This cozy winter tale, with its striking pictures, may appear to be cold but is quite the opposite.'

Will has spent most of his life in Cincinnati, Ohio, where he grew up as the youngest of four boys. His childhood routines revolved around the neighborhood, his parents' barbershop, the Northern Hills Library, playing baseball, and drawing. He now works in a small studio in the upstairs of his Cape Cod home, which he shares with his wife, Jane, a kindergarten teacher. Their son lan, a geologist, is an avid reader and writer of many published scientific papers. Currently, he is doing postdoctoral work at the United States Geological Survey in Denver, Colorado.

THE DE GRUMMOND CHILDREN'S LITERATURE COLLECTION

Founded in 1966 by Dr. Lena de Grummond, the de Grummond Children's Literature Collection is the result of one woman's dream to collect original materials from authors and illustrators of children's books to use as resources for students in library science. Today, the collection has grown far beyond its original intent and is now one of the largest such collections in North America.

While the collection has many strengths, it mainly focuses on American and British children's literature, historical as well as contemporary, and it holds original materials and published works in the McCain Library and Archives on the Hattiesburg campus of The University of Southern Mississippi.

The de Grummond Collection contains works from more than 1,400 authors and illustrators, including Randolph Caldecott, John Newbery, Kate Greenaway, Ezra Jack Keats and H.A. and Margret Rey. These are some of the most celebrated names in children's literature, with Caldecott, Newbery, Greenaway and Keats all having prestigious national awards named in their honor, and the Reys being the creators of Curious George.

Keats, the man behind *The Snowy Day*, is one of America's most groundbreaking authors because of his efforts to break the color barrier in children's publishing. *The Snowy Day* is considered to be one of the most important American books of the 20th century. The de Grummond Collection is the sole repository of the works of Ezra Jack Keats, holding original artwork, typescripts, dummies and preliminary sketches for 35 books by the Caldecott Award-winning author/illustrator that compliment the archives of his personal and professional papers.

2025 Ezra Jack Keats Awards

The Ezra Jack Keats (EJK) Foundation, in partnership with the de Grummond Children's Literature Collection at The University of Southern Mississippi (USM), will present the winners of the 2025 Ezra Jack Keats Award, along with four honor books, at the award ceremony on April 10, 2025, during the Fay B. Kaigler Children's Book Festival at USM in Hattiesburg, Miss. The annual EJK Award celebrates exceptional early career authors and illustrators for portraying the multicultural nature of our world in the spirit of Ezra Jack Keats.

Deborah Pope, executive director of the EJK Foundation said, "This year our winner and honor books include stories about comical space aliens in need of human kindness, a little girl's drive to connect with a new culture and her mother, and the barrier-breaking educator Augusta Baker. It's a joy to recognize new writers and illustrators who create such beautiful and entertaining books, books that reflect the childhood experiences and daydreams of our diverse population."

Karlie Herndon, curator of the de Grummond Children's Literature Collection and the Ezra Jack Keats Papers at USM, said, "The 2025 EJK Award Committee has once again selected excellent picture books that are somehow both timely and timeless. Among this year's winners and honors we find stories of curiosity, kindness, and communities coming together. These books will spark creativity, empathy, and joy in young readers, and I couldn't be more excited to welcome these up-and-coming creators into the EJK legacy." Since its inception, the EJK Award has celebrated over 100 exceptional early career authors and illustrators for portraying the multicultural nature of our world, the universal experience of childhood, and the importance of family and community. Past winners include renowned bookmakers Oge Mora, Meg Medina, Christian Robinson, Bryan Collier and Sophie Blackall.









The Ezra Jack Keats Award is co-administered by the EJK Foundation and the de Grummond Children's Literature Collection at The University of Southern Mississippi. A distinguished selection committee of children's literature and early childhood education specialists, librarians, authors and illustrators review the entries and announce the winners and honorees on the second Tuesday in March each year.

Ezra Jack Keats (1916-83) is considered one of America's greatest children's book illustrators and authors. His first book, *The Snowy Day*, which he wrote and illustrated, was published in 1962 and awarded the Caldecott Medal, the most prestigious children's book award for illustration in the United States, in 1963. Keats went on to write and illustrate over 20, now classic, books, including *Peter's Chair, Whistle for Willie* and *A Letter to Amy*. He wanted no child to be an outsider. "If we could see each other exactly as the other is," he wrote, "this would be a different world."



THE FAY B. KAIGLER-RUTH LAMONT AWARD

1998 marked the first presentation of the Kaigler-Lamont Award. The generous financial support of Fay Kaigler of McComb, Miss., made the award possible. Miss Kaigler was well-known for her love of children and, as an elementary teacher, devoted herself for many years to enhancing books and reading in the lives of children. Her students were soon hooked on books. In retirement, she continued to promote books and reading in her local public library. Her dear friend Ruth Lamont, who for many years was a successful school librarian in Baton Rouge, La., shared her passion for making books integral to children's lives.

The Kaigler-Lamont Award recognizes distinguished accomplishments in promoting children's reading by librarians and teachers in Mississippi schools, and by children's librarians in the public libraries of Mississippi.

This year's recipient is **Leah Rials**, librarian at Petal Middle School.

THE MAGNOLIA CHILDREN'S CHOICE AWARD

The Magnolia Children's Choice Award introduces youth to current literature with a goal of instilling a love of reading. The award was established in 2010 and is a partnership between the Mississippi Department of Education, the Mississippi Library Commission, the Mississippi Reading Association, The University of Southern Mississippi's School of Library and Information Science, the de Grummond Children's Literature Collection, the Mississippi Children's Museum and the Mississippi Library Association.



Votes can be cast by Mississippi children in grades K-12. Children in public, private or homeschooled settings are eligible to vote. In order to be eligible to make the reading list (and ultimately be selected by the children as the winner), books must have been published within the past two years. Titles that have won a national award (i.e. Caldecott, Newbery, Sibert, Coretta Scott King, Pura Belprè, National Book Award, etc.) are not eligible for the Magnolia Award, but honor books are, and either the author or illustrator must be living. Nominations may be done by the public and by committees, but final selection of the titles is determined by the committee.

The winning titles in each category are announced at the Fay B. Kaigler Children's Book Festival.

THE GIVERNY AWARD FOR THE BEST CHILDREN'S SCIENCE PICTURE BOOK

The Giverny Award is awarded annually to the best children's science picture book that serves our youngest readers, ages 4-8. Each year, the 15° Laboratory chooses one science picture book, published in the English language in the previous five years, that teaches young readers at least one important scientific principle or promotes science-related attitudes, pursuits or inquiries. Artwork, illustrations and graphics must work in harmony with the story's text; hence, both the author and illustrator receive the award. The award's name alludes to the renowned French village that provided the setting and inspiration for Monet's famous impressionist paintings. Molly Bang, the first Giverny Award recipient, designed the award's seal.

Dr. Burgess's books include Pass It On!, a graphic biography about the intertwined legacies of her father, Earnest McEwen, Jr., and Nobel Laureate William Faulkner. A Mississippi native, she now lives in North Carolina and enjoys experiencing and learning about new cultures.

RAMONA CAPONEGRO is a professor in the

School of Library and Information Studies at the University of Alabama, where she specializes in children's literature and youth services. She is the chair of the 2026 Newbery Committee and has chaired or served on the Caldecott, Pura Belpré, and Phoenix Picture Book Award Committees. She researches children's books about the legal system, diverse youth literature, book awards, and early readers.

HALLIE CHRISTENSEN is a children's author who loves to write books full of adventure and hope. Her middle grade fantasy Enchanted Misadventures with Great-Aunt Poppy was published in 2021 (Sweetwater Books). She's an active member of the Society of Children's Book Writers and Illustrators (SCBWI) and loves connecting with other readers and writers on social media. This session will equip you with ideas on session structure, writing prompts, and critique techniques used by published writers.

DESIGNING DIVERSE, DISABILITY-FRIENDLY SPACES: CRAFTING ACCESSIBLE STUDY AND COMPUTER ROOMS FOR ALL

This presentation focuses on ensuring library spaces are inclusive, user-friendly, and meet accessibility standards for all users, including those with disabilities. It equips participants with actionable steps to make library spaces more accessible, supporting a diverse range of users in an inclusive academic environment. By the end of the workshop, participants will understand the key principles of universal design and accessibility standards, learn how to evaluate and arrange study and computer rooms to meet ADA guidelines, gain insight into the technology, furniture, and spatial configurations that support users with disabilities, and learn how to collaborate with campus partners such as IT and disability services to enhance accessibility.

2025 CONCURRENT SESSION DESCRIPTIONS

DIVERSITY IN MANGA: HELPING PATRONS SEE THEMSELVES IN A DIFFERENT FORMAT

Keeping Manga on a library's shelves can be a struggle and thinking about expanding the collection for a more inclusive representation is essential in this genre beloved by a wide range of ages. Manga publishers like Saturday AM are working to close the racial gaps in manga, while other series highlight a wide range of abilities and cultures that libraries should prioritize for their collections to create a more accurate representation of the communities they serve. This session will discuss various communities to include to expand representation efforts within manga offerings. Collection development resources will also be highlighted to assist libraries find the manga that is ideal for their communities.

DRAWING THE LINE: ONE CARTOONISTS JOURNEY INTO VISUAL STORYTELLING

Marshall Ramsey, an award-winning editorial cartoonist and creator of the new book Saving Sam! A Banjo the Dog Story, shares a workshop that will teach participants how to storyboard (from a 3rdgrade exercise he credits for teaching him how to create visual stories from the written word). He also will take participants through an exercise that even Harold and his purple crayon would appreciate: audience members draw a line and Ramsey turns it into a cartoon. This fun and educational program has been a part of the Saving Sam! booksigning tour. To quote Dr. Kathleen Grigsby. Assistant Superintendent JPS, "The interactive elements, including a brief Q&A, encouraged the children to think critically and express their thoughts on the book's themes. Overall, the event was an enriching experience and left a lasting impact on the children, who walked away with valuable lessons, a love for reading, and their very own signed book."

DR. SEUSS AND THE MILITARY INDUSTRIAL COMPLEX: HOW TO TEACH WAR

As our world grows increasingly complex and information widely more available, teachers are left trying to help students make sense of their world and its conflicts. This workshop is a practical and scholastic case study on how to use Dr. Seuss's "The Butter Battle Book" as a means to have difficult yet meaningful conversations about war, ideological division, and even nuclear deterrence in a K-12 setting. Participants will leave this session with a clear understanding of how to implement this text to educate the children they may serve whether at home or in the classroom.

ENGAGING STUDENT CURIOSITY TO PROPEL DEVELOPMENT OF LITERACY SKILLS

This session provides an evidence-based case for leveraging student curiosity to motivate students and help them strengthen critical reading and writing skills. The session provides practical tips, techniques, and worksheets for educators to help students curate a list of topics in which they are interested. Provided activities then encourage students to use their areas of interest as a springboard to expand their reading across a variety of genres and formats, and as inspiration for every phase of the writing process.

EXPLORING THE MAGNOLIA BOOK AWARDS, MISSISSIPPI CHILDREN'S CHOICE AWARD

The Magnolia Book Awards provides the children and youth of Mississippi the opportunity to nominate, read, and vote for their favorite books. Please join us to learn more about the Magnolia Award and participate in discussion to explore integrating the Magnolia Award into school or public library settings. The Magnolia Award has four voting categories: PreK-2nd Grade, 3rd-5th Grade, 6th-8th Grade, and 9th-12th Grade. FUNDING, PROGRAMMING, AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT: HOW THE MISSISSIPPI HUMANITIES COUNCIL CAN BENEFIT LIBRARIES

In this session, the Mississippi Humanities Council will discuss funding opportunities for local libraries, as well as Council-conducted reading programs for all ages. Attendees can hear first-hand from state-wide partners about their experiences hosting Great Stories Club, Luciérnagas, and Speakers Bureau programs.

According to the Bureau of Justice Statistics, over 1.4 million children in the United States have a parent in prison. Find out how public and school libraries can provide resources and support to children and families impacted by incarceration through collection development, outreach, and programming. This session will highlight developmentally relevant books for K-12 readers published within the last 10 years that explore issues of incarceration and their impacts on families, as well as the increasing range of outreach efforts and programs that libraries across the country offer to children and families affected by incarceration.

INCLUSIVITY IN STORY TIME: A BEGINNER'S TOOLBOX

Have you wondered how to make your library programs more inclusive for children of different abilities? Join this session for information on inclusive library programming for ages 0-5. Learn about techniques to utilize within your programs and leave with materials and resources that you can begin using tomorrow!

LET'S WRITE A STORY!

In this engaging workshop—after a brief presentation on how her life story influenced her writing—award-winning author Linda Williams Jackson will guide participants through five steps of good storytelling. In this fun and practical workshop, participants will be given tools and tips to use with their own library patrons in order to help them write stories.

MLC'S SPECIAL COLLECTIONS AND YOUR LIBRARY

MLC has a variety of non-traditional items in our Special Collections that are available for libraries to use for programming and outreach. We have book club kits, costumes, crafting items, games, puppets, STEM items, and more! Come learn about what is included in Special Collections and how you can use it.

PROGRAMMING ON THE FLY: BUILDING A PROGRAMMING TOOLKIT FOR RAINY DAYS

Let's be honest- stuff happens! Whether it's a day-of presenter cancellation, the employee in charge is out sick, the story time craft supplies aren't going to work with this group, the supplies didn't arrive in the mail in time- there has been at least once where we all needed a last-minute program idea for our patrons or students. More specifically, we need a program that we can put together quickly, relates to a book, and doesn't break the bank! In this session, we will share fun, engaging program ideas to pull out of your back pocket for your public or school library!

2025 CONCURRENT SESSION DESCRIPTIONS

PROMOTING ENGAGING READING EXPERIENCES WITH PHYSICAL ACTIVITIES

Keeping all young patrons interested in story times or library programs that focus on a specific read can be a feat, and incorporating physical activities can leave a lasting impression for patrons and their families. From very basic stretches to activities paired with texts, library programs become all the more engaging the moment we tell young patrons that they will need to move. This session will provide you with new ideas for physical activity, as well as remind you to dust off old favorites to keep your patrons invested in story time for long after they've left.

PROVING CONCEPT THROUGH PODCASTING

Taking the cold leap to sharing your manuscript with publishers can be intimidating, especially for those who've never published before. When Brett Harris struggled to find a daily story for his family to read in the lead up to Christmas, he wrote one. Instead of sending it blindly to publishers, he connected with a illustrator Adam Trest to produce "Drawing Out Advent," a 24-day podcast version of the story as a proof of concept to share in future conversations with publishers. Learn how the stats, downloads, and entier podcast process can help shape your story for future publication.

SENSORY PROGRAMMING AT YOUR LIBRARY: CREATING MEANINGFUL, HANDS-ON LEARNING EXPERIENCES THROUGH IMAGINATIVE (AND MESSY) PLAY

The 21st century library is innovative, loud, and... messy? In this session, explore the benefits of incorporating hands-on sensory activities and imaginative play into your public library's program offerings. We will discuss the importance of sensory play, how sensory play advances literacy initiatives, the different types of sensory play, and the skills that these activities develop. Several examples of successful hands-on, sensory-based programs will be discussed, including how to make this programming work for any budget or space.

STEAMY LITERATURE! HOW TO PAIR YOUR FAVORITE PICTURE BOOKS WITH STEAM ACTIVITIES

In this session you will be presented with some easy, low prep STEAM activities that you can use in your classroom or school library that connect with some of the most popular Picture books. You will take home lessons to use throughout the year to integrate science, technology, engineering, art, and math into the units you are already teaching. This session will inspire you to branch out of your comfort zone without taking up more of your precious planning time.

STRANGERS INTO NEIGHBORS: ENGAGING COMMUNITY CONVERSATIONS THAT MATTER

How do you engage community members in meaningful conversations? One way is by creating a safe space for thoughtful exploration and discussion, using Guided Conversations. Cocreated by community engagement specialists & educators at the University of Mississippi & one of the session presenters, Guided Conversations is a simple yet powerful resource that can be used by librarians, community members, teachers, students, and parents. When used effectively, Guided Conversations can open the door to rich, rewarding dialogue. Participants will leave with new strategies for programming, insights on creating safe space, and a plan for how to use this engaging resource to turn strangers into neighbors.



2025 CONCURRENT SESSION DESCRIPTIONS

TAKING A WHOLE-SCHOOL READ TO THE NEXT LEVEL TO HELP STUDENTS CREATE CROSS-CURRICULAR CONNECTIONS, BUILD EMPATHY, GRIT AND RESILIENCE, AND STRENGTHEN THE OVERALL SCHOOL COMMUNITY


