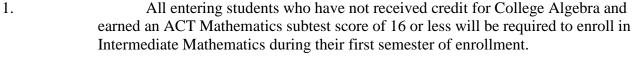

The committee recommends that the University of Southern Mississippi follow the IHL guidelines with some additional requirements.



- 2. All entering students whose Mathematics subtest score is 17 18 must enroll in Intermediate Mathematics. A student who successfully completes a placement test administered during the first week of Intermediate Mathematics may drop the intermediate course and enroll in College Algebra.
- 3. All entering students whose Mathematics subtest score is 19 should be strongly urged to enroll in Intermediate Math to take the placement test to indicate readiness for College Algebra.

- All entering students who have not earned credit for six hours of English Composition and scored an ACT English subtest score of 16 or less will be required to take Intermediate English during their first semester of enrollment.
- Students whose English subtest score is 19-17 should be strongly encouraged to take Intermediate English. This policy should be phased in over a period of four years. (Students with ACT English subtest scores of 16 or less will be accommodated the first year, and students with subtest scores of 17 or less the following year, and continued in this manner until all students with subtest scores of 19 or less have the opportunity to take Intermediate English.)
 - All entering students who have not earned credit for 6 hours of social science, 3 hours of Speech Communication, and 3 hours of literature and earned an ACT Reading subtest score of 20 or less will be required to take Intermediate Reading during their first semester of enrollment. Students taking Intermediate Reading will not be permitted to take courses in literature, Speech Communication, and/or social sciences.
 - Students taking two or more intermediate courses must enroll in the year-long Academic Support Program and will not be permitted to take more than 15 semester hours, including intermediate courses and the Academic Support Program.
 - Departments may arrange to give placements tests from 8:00 9:00 during preview sessions. Contact Freshman Year Experience Director to develop the details.

The committee further recommends that these policies be stated in the Bulletin, imbedded in PeopleSoft advisement and registration modules, and publicized to faculty advisors and students.

Resolved that the duly elected representatives of the faculty serving on the Academic Council respectfully request that the administration reassess its budget priorities to protect and maintain instructional resources to a greater extent than is currently proposed in budget allocations.

General Education Curriculum

In 1999, the Academic Council of the University embarked on a major revision of the basic curriculum required of all undergraduate students. The result of the Council's deliberations was the General Education Curriculum as adopted in The revised General Education Curriculum will go into effect in the Fall Semester

General Education Curriculum Vision Statement: The General Education Curriculum at the University of Southern Mississippi is designed to educate students who upon graduation:

- enjoy lives enriched by a broad range of knowledge, critical thinking, analytical skills, aesthetic appreciation, historical and social awareness, scientific literacy, and effectiveness in oral and written communication;
- 2 are energized by a spirit of inquiry and enthusiasm for problem solving;
- 3 assume leadership roles;
- 4 are engaged local, national, and global citizens;
- 5 are flexible and resourceful in adapting to professional and social change;
- 6 integrate knowledge across subjects and disciplines; and
- 7 assess information and make choices conscious of intellectual, social, and ethical contexts.

General Education Curriculum Mission Statement: The General Education Curriculum is interwoven with college and departmental requirements and with the student's experience within the broader university community. The General Education Curriculum encourages the spirit of inquiry, the breadth of awareness, and the skills of analysis that provide a foundation and context for the challenges and possibilities of a lifetime of learning.

The General Education Curriculum fosters the skills of learning and communication; the acquisition and integration of knowledge; the development of logical and critical thinking; and the enlargement and refinement of understanding of the individual's responsibility to self and society. The undergraduate experience at the University of Southern Mississippi produces students who appreciate both the differences between and the connections among specific subject matters and disciplines, and their relation to general knowledge.

General Education Curriculum Learning Objectives: Fourteen discrete learning objectives organized around five broad principles inform the structure and content of the General Education Curriculum.

Essential Skills

- Graduates will have and demonstrate suitable reading, writing, and other communication skills.
- Graduates will have and demonstrate fundamental mathematical and computer skills.

Acquisition and Integration of Knowledge

- 3. Graduates will have and demonstrate knowledge of the methods, basic data, ideas and explanation, and scope of the physical and life sciences.
- 4. Graduates will have and demonstrate an understanding of contemporary issues and concerns.
- 5. Graduates will have and demonstrate an awareness and understanding of the development and interrelationships of societies from a global perspective.
- 6. Graduates will have and demonstrate an understanding that society consists of integrated and complex social systems.
- 7. Graduates will have and demonstrate an understanding of connections among different subjects and ideas.

Aesthetic Understanding

8. Graduates will have and demonstrate an understanding and appreciation of artistic, creative and cultural expression.

Development of Logical and Critical Thinking

9. Graduates will have and demonstrate a capacity for intellectual independence and analytical thought. They demonstrate the ability to seek and evaluate information by asking questions, to make judicious decisions by basing judgments on evidence, to understand and assess various kinds of reasoning, and to use critical thinking skills in all areas of their lives.

Responsibility, Self, and Society

- Graduates will have and demonstrate an understanding of themselves and others as physical, psychological, emotional, and moral individuals.
- 11. Graduates will have and demonstrate an understanding of people as moral agents. They will understand the nature of moral reasoning and ethical decision-making, character, responsibility, duties and obligations, and justice.
- 12. Graduates will have and demonstrate an understanding of the implications of diversity among individuals.
- 13. Graduates will have and demonstrate an understanding of the implications of diversity within and among social systems.
- 14. Graduates will have and demonstrate knowledge and appreciation of foreign cultures.

The General Education Curriculum comprises 38 hours divided among five categories.

I. Written and Oral Communication: 9 hours

Fluency in written and oral communication are hallmarks of an educated person. For fluency in communication is valued not only on its own merit but also because demonstration of communication skills reflects the fact that individuals possess reading and critical thinking skills. Therefore, the General Education Curriculum emphasizes the development in all students of mature communication skills.

To fulfill the written and oral communication requirement, students must complete a series of specified courses (English 101, Freshmen Seminar, Junior Seminar, and a Senior Capstone Experience). They must also complete courses designated as writing intensive and speaking intensive (Freshman Seminar, Junior Seminar, a Senior Capstone Experience, and an additional upper-division course writing-intensive course).

Writing Requirement

Students scoring 17 or above on the English language portion of the ACT must enroll in English 101 during their first semester at the University. (Students scoring 16 or below on the English language portion of the ACT must complete an appropriate remedial course or courses and immediately thereafter enroll in English 101). In their second semester, students must enroll in a Freshman Seminar. During the first semester of their junior year, students must enroll in a Junior Seminar.

Thus, the six-hour core requirement in written and oral communication can be met through successful completion of the following courses:

English 101
Freshman Seminar
Junior Seminar

Composition

(Students receiving transfer credit for English 102 are not required to complete a Freshman Seminar.)

Classes in which learning to write and writing to learn play a significant role are not limited to those two courses. The vast majority of courses offered in the General Education Curriculum require a minimum of 2,500 words to be written outside of the classroom, as well as significant essay components on examinations and in laboratory sections.

Writing-Intensive Courses

Students must complete four writing-intensive courses. Writing-intensive courses are identified in the schedule of classes by the letters "WI." Writing-intensive courses are defined as those that, while focusing on a specific subject matter (with corresponding readings and discussions), encourage students to think critically and creatively, outline a subject matter or theme, and draft written essays. In writing-intensive courses, students write a minimum of 5,000 typewritten words (roughly twenty pages) in a multi-paragraph research paper or in a series of shorter essays. Class enrollments are capped at 24.

All Freshman and Junior seminars, as well as the Senior Capstone Experience, are writing intensive; one additional writing-intensive courses must be taken at the upper-division level (i.e. 300-400 level courses).

Oral Communication Requirement

Many majors require that students complete an oral communication course. To satisfy the General Education Curriculum requirement that students develop mature speaking skills, students speak in course discussions and, more importantly, in formal public speeches delivered in all Freshman and Junior Seminars and in Senior Capstone Experience courses. Each of the seminars requires successful completion of a minimum of two graded and video recorded speeches. The speaking components in those classes value clarity of presentation, ideas, and voice, professionalism, and rhetorical grace and precision.

The Seminars

The Freshman and Junior Seminars and the Senior Capstone Experience are designed to be communication intensive. All seminars are taught by tenured or tenure-track faculty members and class enrollments are limited to 24. Seminars are listed in the class schedule under the names of the colleges offering them and designated by an appropriate number (for example, College of Liberal Arts 100, College of Liberal Arts 300); courses are listed in the same manner on transcripts, though a title descriptive of the course content also appears on the transcript. To receive credit for the seminars, students must receive a grade of "C" or better.

The Freshman Seminar

The Freshman Seminar offers students an intellectually engaging introduction to the world of the scholar. While studying a specific subject matter, reading extensively, and learning how scholars in a discipline ask questions and answer them, students learn to construct problems that they must then solve. They also learn to communicate their solutions effectively to other students and the professor. Thus, students learn how to learn and how to convey their knowledge.

Such skills are of significance to all university students. For once students begin to acquire those skills, they are prepared to commit themselves more fully to their studies; they discover the value of involving themselves in their own education; and they lay the foundation for life-long learning.

The Junior Seminar

The Junior Seminar, which should be taken in the first semester of the student's third year of study, differs from the Freshman Seminar in that it is purposefully designed to be interdisciplinary and integrative across disciplines; often it is team-taught by regular faculty from different departments and colleges. Thus, the seminar functions as a General Education Curriculum capstone course that seeks to build on the knowledge and essential skills obtained in core classes. Students may not take for General Education Curriculum credit a Junior Seminar taught by a faculty member in their major(s) or minor department.

Senior Capstone Experience

Each major requires that students participate in a capstone experience that is communication intensive. The experience may be a senior seminar or other course (including student teaching), provided that the course meets the written and oral communication requirements outlined above and provided that the department utilizes the course as a means of assessing student achievement of departmental learning objectives and shares its findings related to General Education Curriculum skills with the Academic Council's General Education Assessment Committee.

II. Basic Science and Mathematics: 11 hours

Science Requirement: 8 hours

The goal of the science requirement within the General Education Curriculum is to provide students with a fundamental understanding of the methods, basic data, ideas and explanation, and scope of the physical and life sciences.

Students must one four-hour lecture and laboratory class from the Life Science category and one four-hour lecture and laboratory class from the Physical Science category.

The goal of the mathematics requirement is to provide students with the fundamental skills to construct and solve equations, a form of reasoning that has long proven essential for students working in disciplines as diverse as the sciences and the fine arts.

III. Global History and Culture: 12 hours

The primary objectives of the Global History and Culture requirement are the development of student understanding of the interrelationship of societies; the implications of diversity among individuals and social systems; the integrated and complex nature of social systems; contemporary issues and concerns; the links between different subjects and disciplines; and foreign cultures.

To achieve the General Education Curriculum objectives that the category seeks to fulfill, students must chose three hours in one of the social sciences listed below; and they must complete English 203; either History 101 or History 102; and either History 101, History 102, Philosophy 101, or Religion 151.

Some sections of the courses will be offered as part of a learning community experience, providing blocks of students the opportunity to take clusters of courses that have common lecture topics, share out-of-class experiences, and utilize shared reading and writing assignments. The variety of options for integrating content and skills in clustered courses is limitless, and faculty participating in the learning community are encouraged to abet student development in creative ways that encourage cooperative learning while achieving the objectives of the Global History and Culture requirement.
