SOC 564 (Qualitative Methods) may be substituted for PS 611 with permission of advisor. The thesis committee may, at its discretion, conduct exams concurrently with the thesis defense. A 3.0 GPA is required for graduation. Students must select a major (comprised of at least 9 hours, 3 of which must be 700 level) and two minors (comprised of at least 6 hours, 3 of which must be 700 level) from the 6 fields of political science. Students must register for 6 hours of PS 698 - Thesis.

Master of Arts

Requirements for the Master of Arts degree include thirty-three (33) semester hours of coursework (21 hours of 600 level or higher), including PS 611 and PS 612 and a comprehensive examination. SOC 564 (Qualitative Methods) may be substituted for PS 611 with permission of advisor. Students must select a major (comprising at least 9 hours, 3 of which must be 700 level) and two minors (comprising at least 6 hours, 3 of which must be 700 level) from the 6 fields of political science. A 3.0 GPA is required for graduation

Thesis option: Students must complete a thesis and an oral defense of the thesis. Students must register for 6 hours of PS 698 - Thesis. The thesis committee may, at its discretion, conduct exams concurrently with the thesis defense.

Non-thesis option: Students must also register for 3 hours of 692 as special project. They must also take 3 hours of PS 691 to complete their research paper under the supervision of a professor in their major area and produce a substantial research paper equal in quality but not in scope, to a thesis.

Performance (Collaborative Piano) DMA Assessment Plan

Mission / Purpose:

The mission and purpose of the DMA degree with Collaborative Piano emphasis is to prepare students for careers as collaborative teachers/musicians. The degree curriculum will produce teacher-scholars and/or teacher-performers enabled to pursue independent advanced-level research and/or performance from a background of highly detailed knowledge of music history, music theory, pedagogy, and their major area of study. Graduates are qualified to pursue a wide-variety of careers in various roles: public and private school music teachers, private lesson instructors, church musicians, music program consultants, freelance musicians, accompanists, arts lobbyists, musical theater directors, teachers at community college or regional liberal arts institutions, and as teachers at universities, including those with R1 status.

1. Student Learning Objective Title: Music History Knowledge

Description: Student competency in music history will be assessed in MUS 630 through exams and projects.

2. Student Learning Objective Title: Music Theory Competency

Description: Student competency in music history will be assessed in MUS 620 through exams and projects

3. Student Learning Objective Title: Applied Performance Prowess

Description: Students will demonstrate refined performance ability as measured by two categories on their major instrument: technical facility and musical maturity. To be assessed in MUP 801 through end of semester jury

4. Student Learning Objective Title: Bibliography Knowledge

Description: Students will be assessed in MUS 702 on their knowledge of and ability to notate sources for music research through projects and bibliography assignments

5. Student Learning Objective Title: Recital

Description: Students in the DMA degree are required to display applied instrument proficiency by performing a full recital with lecture/program notes.

6. Student Learning Objective Title: Diction

Description: Students will be assessed in MUS 539 on their knowledge of and ability to apply best practice in teaching and assessment of correct diction using the International Phonetic Alphabet (IPA) through a final examination.

7. Student Learning Objective Title: Vocal Literature

Description: Students will be assessed on their knowledge of and ability to apply best practice in vocal literature in MUS 540 through an essay examination and a Comparative Listening

Assignment

8. Student Learning Objective Title: Chamber Music Literature

Description: Students will be assessed in MUS 558 on their knowledge of and experience performing the various styles and applications of chamber music from all historical periods, including but not exclusive of ensemble literature composed for piano and other instruments through exams and projects.

9. Student Learning Objective Title: Sight Reading

Description: Students will be assessed in MUP 801 on their ability to sight read various styles and applications of chamber music from all historical periods through playing tests during the semester.

1. Program Objective Title: Retention

Description: Retention of students in this degree will be measured by degree enrollment from the previous spring to the current spring semester.

2. Program Objective Title: Graduation

Description: Students will graduate at a rate that is adequate of overall *retention* rates indicated in the fall semester.

DMA in Collaborative Piano

Candidacy Audition

All students must audition for the appropriate area faculty. This audition must be deemed Satisfactory before one can be accepted into the School of Music (i.e., before completing nine (9) hours of graduate work). Early auditions are encouraged, and a high level of performance proficiency is expected. In lieu of a candidacy audition, with the approval of the School of Music Graduate Committee, students who will complete the Master of Music degree in Performance at USM may use their graduate recital. The appropriate faculty must attend the recital, and the printed program must state the total purpose of the concert, e.g., "This recital is given in partial fulfillment of the requirements for the degree Master of Music in Performance, and it also serves as an audition for acceptance into the Doctor of Musical Arts curriculum in the School of Music." The student must begin doctoral study within one year of this audition. (See page 3)

Curricular choices may be determined by several factors including the student's performance on the qualifying examination and entrance audition, and the student's interests and/or professional goals. A 3.0 GPA is required for graduation. Graduate Students must receive a grade of B- or better in any class in order for it to count toward the graduation requirements.

Recitals

Four Recitals will be required in addition to the candidacy audition. Three will be a combination of vocal and instrumental repertoire. The fourth will be a lecture recital accompanied by a lecture document (approx. 30 pages in length). In order to ensure a holistic approach to collaborative piano, <u>recital repertoire will be an equal representation of instrumental, vocal and orchestral reduction repertoire.</u>

As a general rule, not more than one doctoral recital may be presented by a candidate during any academic term, or more than two during any nine-month period. Rare exceptions will be permitted, but under rigidly-controlled procedures. See the Graduate Coordinator for details.

Language Requirement

Satisfactory competence in English and German, French, or Italian is required for candidacy and must be approved by the Advisory Committee. Competence in a foreign language can be demonstrated by: a) having already completed two semesters (6 hours) of coursework in German, French or Italian with a grade of B- or higher at a previous institution; b) completing two semesters (6 hours) of coursework in German, French or Italian with a grade of B- or higher at the University of Southern Mississippi. c) completing the College-Level Examination Program (CLEP) test in French or German. The CLEP can be taken at many sites. Students must obtain a minimum score on the total test in one of the languages as follows: French 43; German 39. Satisfactory performance on language exams, administered by the USM Department of Foreign Languages and Literatures, also is acceptable. Others may be required by the major professor and the graduate Advisory Committee. Students may transfer these hours from an accredited institution upon admission, provided that the most advanced of the courses was taken within the last six calendar years.

- The first movement from a Mozart orchestral reduction. Choose one from the following:

 - Flute: K. 313/285c in G major
 - Oboe: K. 314/271k in C major
 - Clarinet: K. 622 in A major
 - Bassoon: K. 191 in Bb major
- Prepare 3 songs in each language from the following list (Total nine songs). We will select three for you to perform at your audition.

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Proposed Grading System for Graduate Coursework – Revised 4/12/17 for Graduate Council consideration. NO VOTE TAKEN. MORE DISCUSSION NEEDED.

The proposed changes seek to accomplish two goals – (1) Ensuring consistent use of these courses across the graduate curriculum by defining the nature of each type of course and providing guidance about when to utilize these courses, and (2) in an effort to curb the practice of enrolling in courses simply to "fill" the schedule, an A-F grading scheme will be required of all courses listed below.

- A. Research Courses (often numbered 691, 791, with course component as "Research") are to be taken when students conduct research under the direction of a faculty member. These cannot be used to simply "fill" the student's schedule and should reflect actual work being completed by the student. A syllabus is required which defines the grading scale. Acceptable grades: A, B, C, D, or F only
 - a. Note: DNP students will continue to enroll in the nursing capstone course.
- B. Special *Problems* (previously referred to as Independent Study and numbered generally as 697/797, with course component as "Individual Directed Studies") is used to reflect research or other topic-specific learning being completed under the direction of a faculty member outside of the typical classroom structure and typically used only for individualized or very small group interactions. These courses do count toward the degree and a title must be required in SOAR. A syllabus is required which defines the grading scale. Acceptable grades: A, B, C, D, or F only
 - a. For non-thesis programs, special problems may be used to mark the submission of a portfolio or other capstone/ comprehensive project.

C. Special *Topics* (may be numbered 692/792 or other number scheme as determined by the department) is used to reflect an *actual class* to include a day/time/classroom/online course designation. Special Topics are often used for classes which will not be offered consistently and/or haven't received a permanent course number. A title must be required in SOAR. Departments may need to designate or create such a variable-topic course if it does not already exist. A syllabus is required. Acceptable grades: A, B, C, D, or F only

Note: Any course taught regularly should be submitted for approval through the Graduate Council. College curriculum committees should discuss additional measures to ensure that courses using the special topics designation are being regularly reviewed.

D. Independent Study (often numbered 697; 797, with course component as "Independent Study) is used for graduate students who are not in residence but who are actively working on a thesis, project, or dissertation, must enroll for at least one hour each semester (from Graduate Bulletin). These courses should not be used by graduate

Thesis and Dissertation credits (often numbered 698 and 898 with course component as "Thesis" or "Dissertation") should be taken throughout the thesis or dissertation research process.

Acceptable grades: S (satisfactory) or U (Unsatisfactory) only. "E" grades for ongoing work followed by P or F should be discontinued.

• An "S" grade should be awarded when a student makes satisfactory progress on thesis or dissertation research as evaluated by the committee chair/major professor or advisor, based on expectations communicated at the start of the semester.

• The "U" grade should be awarded when a student fails to make satisfactory progress on thesis or dissertation research as evaluated by the committee chair/major professor or advisor, based on expectations communicated at the start of the semester.

- A single "U" grade will result in a student being placed on probation the following semester of enrollment; a student cannot take comprehensive exams or defend a thesis/dissertation while on probation.
- The student can return to good academic standing following the next semester an S grade is earned in thesis/dissertation research.
- One "U" grade can be changed to an "S" if the student receives "S" grades for two consecutive semesters of thesis/dissertation research.
- Two U grades earned at any point (not necessarily consecutively) during the course of study will result in dismissal from the program.
- A grade of P is assigned once the student has completed all degree requirements, successfully defended the thesis/ dissertation, submitted the finalized document and it is approved by the graduate reader.

• Neither the S nor the U grade will carry quality points; but both will carry credit.

Biological Sciences Graduate Student is Graduate Assistant of the Year

Dhiraj Acharya, a doctoral student in the Department of Biological Sciences, was selected as the 2017 Graduate Assistant of the Year. Working with his major professor, Dr. Fengwei Bai, Dhiraj studies the immunopathogenesis of mosquito-borne viruses that cause debilitating and often lifethreating infections of humans, including West Nile, Zika, and Chikungunya viruses. Dhiraj began his graduate degree program at Southern Miss in 2012. Since then he published three peer-reviewed, first-author articles and is co-author of eight additional articles which appeared in top journals in his discipline. He is co-author of a book chapter, author of a chapter in a general microbiology laboratory manual, and holds a patent with Dr. Bai for discovery of a novel immunological function that promotes West Nile viral clearance in the host. Serving as a teaching assistant for three years, Dhiraj has taught microbiology lab to numerous undergraduate students, and he trained many students performing undergraduate research in Dr. Bai's lab. Dhiraj earned a master of science in microbiology in his home country of Nepal in 2008, where he was awarded a "Gold Medal" by the president of Nepal. As the 2017 GA of the Year, Dhiraj was presented with a plaque and a \$500 cash award. His portrait will be added to the 2017 Graduate Student Hall of

Dr. Brad Dufrene, professor and director of the School Psychology Service Center in the Department of Psychology, was named 2017 Graduate Mentor of the Year at the Susan A. An active researcher with more than forty peer-reviewed articles and three book chapters published, Dr. Dufrene's research focuses on prevention of emotional and/or behavioral disturbance in young children experiencing health disparities; treatment integrity in applied settings; and functional behavior assessment.

Application Deadlines

Tracy Barnhill, Manager of Graduate Admissions, notified departments of the need for each department to set appropriate deadlines for prospective students to submit applications to their programs and pay the application fee. Required application documents may still be received after the application is submitted (transcripts, letters of reference, etc.), so deadlines should be early enough for those additional documents to be received and applications to be completed before departmental review. Operations Updates

Summer Enrollment for Students Holding Summer Graduate Assistantships

After consultation with appropriate administrative offices and the academic deans, the following modification to required summer enrollment for students holding summer GA's will be in effect this summer. Eligible summer GA's may hold the assistantship while enrolling in a minimum of 1 credit hour during summer 2017, rather than the 3 hours normally required for full-time summer enrollment. This change does not limit GA's to 1 hour; up to 3 hours will be awarded if needed. The change will allow us to utilize tuition waivers more effectively. To be eligible for the 1 hour minimum summer enrollment the following conditions must be met (in consultation with HR):

- 1. If a continuing student, the student must have been enrolled full time and held an assistantship during spring 2017 and must be already enrolled full time for fall 2017.
- 2. If graduating during summer 2017, the student must have been enrolled full time and held an assistantship during spring 2017 and has applied for graduation for summer 2017

For those offices that have already submitted tuition waiver requests for students meeting the requirements for the 1 hour option, please submit an amended request to Shelby Flores only for those students who are affected.

Note: The 1 hour enrollment option <u>does not</u> apply to federal work study assistantships. Work study GA's must register for a minimum of 3 hours during the summer.

Graduation Deferment Form Update

To remedy this situation, the deferment form was modified to include a signature line for the student's committee chair or department chair. Doctoral Degree Programs

Doctor of Philosophy in Psychology

The department offers the Doctor of Philosophy in psychology in four emphasis areas: clinical, counseling, brain and behavior, and school psychology. These doctoral emphasis areas are designed to ensure that students receive strong preparation in the research and theoretical literature of psychology as an experimental behavioral science.

Students are admitted to one of these doctoral programs and earn a master's degree (M.A.) in psychology en route to the doctorate. Applicants are judged on the basis of prior academic record, GRE scores, three letters of recommendation from persons qualified to assess the applicant's readiness for graduate study, and personal statement. Applicants are expected to have completed appropriate undergraduate foundation courses in psychology (e.g., statistics, experimental, and history and systems). A student may be invited to come to campus for a personal interview as part of the application process. The department typically receives applications from a larger number of qualified applicants than it can enroll. Prospective students should specify their intended emphasis area at time of application. Descriptions of each of these areas are available online at www.usm.edu/psychology. New students are admitted only for fall semester. Applications received by December 1 (clinical, counseling, school) or January 3 (Brain and Behavior) will receive a full review.

The Department of Psychology values diversity, and members of underrepresented groups are strongly encouraged to apply. Additionally, whereas participation in on-campus admissions seminars and interviews is highly recommended for applicants who enter the final selection pool, alternative arrangements may be requested through the director of training for those individuals who are unable to travel to Hattiesburg.

Residency

Students must meet the residency requirements specified in this Bulletin.

Research and Scholarly Integrity Education

All faculty holding Regular or Associate graduate faculty status, must complete CITI training modules required by the Graduate School and their departments. All graduate students must complete the CITI training modules required by the Graduate School and their departments the first semester they are enrolled in graduate school. The RSIE policy and training information are found on the Graduate School web page –<u>www.usm.edu/graduate-school</u>. Contact the Dean of the Graduate School if you have any questions regarding the policy of training information.

Comprehensive Exam

Beginning in the fall 2018, admissions to the Master's in Psychology (Applied Behavior Analysis Emphasis) will be suspended. The Program is offered in the Department of Psychology on the Hattiesburg campus. Suspension of admissions will take place immediately in anticipation of the Fall 2018 semester. Due to cuts in teaching resources and the inability to cover classes with current School Psychology Program resources, it is temporarily not possible for the Department of Psychology to admit a cohort to the Program during the fall of 2018. It is anticipated that admissions will resume in the fall 2019 or 2020.

There will be 7 active students remaining in this year's first year cohort which will comprise next year's second year cohort beginning in fall 2018 and will be in the teach-out plan that follows.

PSY 771 – Practicum in School Psychology (covered by SP faculty Keith Radley [Adjunct] and Evan Dart) who possess the supervision credential meeting Behavior Analyst Board standard

At this point, there are 19 MSW students that should complete the emphasis and graduate in May 2018. Nothing needs to be done to address their interest in the emphasis. They will complete the requirements this spring.

Of the remaining 4 students that declared an interest in the Interpersonal Practice emphasis none of them have taken any courses in their curriculum plans related to the emphasis. Thus, informing them that the Interpersonal Emphasis is being eliminated won't disrupt their academic progression at all.

The 4 students that intended to pursue the Interpersonal Practice emphasis will be contacted this semester and informed that the emphasis is being suspended immediately. The student will be advised to take other electives and supported in making those changes in their degree plans. This change does not represent any disruption in their progression in the MSW degree plan.

Our programs and coursework are designed to meet the licensure requirements of licensing entities within Mississippi. We highly recommend that students contact the applicable licensure board(s) in their state of residence or in the state where they intend to obtain a license before beginning an academic program that results in licensure. Many licensure boards require more than successful degree completion to obtain a license.

Please be advised that state laws, regulations, and policies may change at any time. Please find the attached disclosure statement that the Office of the Provost, Office of Online Learning, and the Office of General Counsel would like to have added to the bulletin. This statement is necessary as a result of our participation in NC-SARA. NC-SARA instituted the following requirement for all participating institutions (item 10 from the NC-SARA Institutional Approval Form):

10. Agree to notify in writing all students in a course or program that customarily leads to professional licensure, or which a student could reasonably believe leads to such licensure, whether or not the course or program meets requirements for licensure in the state where the student resides. If an institution cannot determine through its contact with relevant licensing entities whether the course or program meets licensure requirements in the student's state of residence, the institution may meet this SARA requirement by informing the student in writing and providing the student the contact information for the appropriate state licensing board(s). An e-mail dedicated solely to this purpose and sent to the student's best known e-mail address meets this requirement. The institution should use other means to notify the student if needed.

I convened a meeting of the Office of General Counsel, Office of Online Learning, the Office of Admissions, the Graduate School, Associate Deans from each college, and representatives from programs that lead to licensure or might lead to licensure in other states. During this meeting, we determined that it would be impossible for USM to keep up to date with all licensure programs in all 50 states. We are concerned that the ever-changing rules and regulations for licensure requirements in all 50 states would lead to us having out of date information that could misinform students. We determined that a disclosure statement would be the best approach to address this requirement.

The Office of Online Learning will distribute the disclosure statement to online students in programs that lead or could lead to licensure in various states.

Winners of the Graduate School's two most prestigious awards were announced at the Susan A. Siltanen Graduate Student Research Symposium Awards Luncheon on Thursday, March 26. Jessica Guzman, Ph.D.

The GRE is commonly required as a component of graduate applications because it provides an objective measure of an applicant's potential for success in graduate-level study. A key to a strong GRE score is preparation for the exam. To assist with GRE preparation, the Graduate School is hosting a series of GRE boot camps throughout 2018. Supported in part by a grant from the Southern Miss Fund and taught by doctoral students in mathematics and English, the boot camps focus on verbal and quantitative sections of the GRE. Each boot camp consists of two, four-hour sessions. The first boot camp was held on Saturday, March 24th and 31st from 8 a.m. to noon. Boot camp 2 began Tuesday, April 10th from 5:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m., and the second half will be held Tuesday, April 17th. McNair Open House

A Ribbon Cutting Ceremony and Open House will officially celebrate completion of the McNair Scholars space on the first floor of McCain Library on Wednesday, May 2 at 2:00 p.m. The space was renovated during academic year 2017-18 to create classroom, office, and gathering space to support USM's Ronald E. McNair Scholars Program. The program, named in honor of the late Dr. Ronald E. McNair, Ph.D., physicist and Space Shuttle Challenger astronaut who died when the Challenger exploded early into flight on January 28, 1986, is supported by the U.S. Department of Education. The program aims to increase the number of first generation/low income and under-represented individuals completing doctoral programs and entering academia. The Policy & Procedures committee developed a policy statement for the granting of the master's degree on route to the PhD. The statement was reviewed and modified in GC. GC voted to adopt the policy statement below:

Doctoral programs may elect to confer the master's degree en route to the PhD after a student completes thirty hours of graduate courses in the discipline with a GPA of 3.0 and good academic standing; passes a comprehensive examination; meets any other requirements specific to the program; and obtains approval of the of the doctoral committee.

Doctor of Philosophy in Psychology

The department offers the Doctor of Philosophy in psychology in four emphasis areas: clinical, counseling, brain and behavior, and school psychology. These doctoral emphasis areas are designed to ensure that students receive strong preparation in the research and theoretical literature of psychology as an experimental behavioral science.

Students are admitted to one of these doctoral programs and earn a master's degree (M.A.) in psychology en route to the doctorate. Applicants are judged on the basis of prior academic record, GRE scores, three letters of recommendation from persons qualified to assess the applicant's readiness for graduate study, and personal statement. Applicants are expected to have completed appropriate undergraduate foundation courses in psychology (e.g., statistics, experimental, and history and systems). A student may be invited to come to campus for a personal interview as part of the application process. The department typically receives applications from a larger number of qualified applicants than it can enroll. Prospective students should specify their intended emphasis area at time of application. Descriptions of each of these areas are available online at www.usm.edu/psychology. New students are admitted only for fall semester. Applications received by December 1 (clinical, counseling, school) or January 3 (Brain and Behavior) will receive a full review.

The Department of Psychology values diversity, and members of underrepresented groups are strongly encouraged to apply. Additionally, whereas participation in on-campus admissions seminars and interviews is highly recommended for applicants who enter the final selection pool, alternative arrangements may be requested through the director of training for those individuals who are unable to travel to Hattiesburg.

Residency

Students must meet the residency requirements specified in this Bulletin.

Research and Scholarly Integrity Education

All faculty holding Regular or Associate graduate faculty status, must complete CITI training modules required by the Graduate School and their departments. All graduate students must complete the CITI training modules required by the Graduate School and their departments the first semester they are enrolled in graduate school. The RSIE policy and training information are found on the Graduate School web page –www.usm.edu/graduate-school. Comprehensive Exam

Doctoral qualifying exams may be required. A comprehensive exam is required for all doctoral students and must be passed before proceeding to the dissertation. A 3.0 GPA is required for graduation.

With this memo, we are requesting to formally suspend admission of the Instructional Technology and Design PhD, currently classified as a Hattiesburg hybrid program. As Graduate Council is aware, admission to the program was suspended by administrative action under the leadership of Dean Blackwell. This action was taken as a temporary measure in considering the future of the program within its current home in the Department of Curriculum, Instruction, and Special Education, after a department by department, program by program review was undertaken in the College of Education and Psychology prior to Dean Blackwell's departure.

Per actions taken at its January 2018 meeting, the Graduate Council has expressed its support of the movement of this program and its faculty, along with the Instructional Technology MS, to the Department of Human Capital Development in the College of Science and Technology (post reorganization, this department will be located within the School of Interdisciplinary Studies and Professional Development within the College of Arts and Sciences). Suspension of admission will allow the Department of Human Capital Development, its existing faculty along with relocated IT faculty, to give consideration to the best fit and future for the program, without extending the commitment to provide the full existing curriculum to newly admitted students, while teaching out students currently enrolled. Since the ITD PhD program is listed in the program inventory as a hybrid program, admission suspension will also allow for consideration of the needs of any existing students currently taking courses face-to-face, without adding to that delivery burden at an inopportune time in the reorganization and relocation process.

Per Dr. Gaudet's memo (attached), the joint faculty of human capital development and the instructional technology graduate programs plan to "review the existing HCD and IT MS and PhD curricula to determine the most appropriate curriculum framework(s) to blend the programs."


The Bylaws Committee voted unanimously to change "June" to "May."

The new policy reads as follows: "Doctoral programs may elect to confer the master's degree en route to the Ph.D. after a student completes thirty hours of graduate courses in the discipline with a GPA of 3.0 and good academic standing; passes a comprehensive examination; meets any other requirements specific to the program; and obtains approval of the graduate committee."

Graduate Enrollment Deadline Enacted

In consultation with the Registrar and with approval by Provost Steven Moser, a deadline for graduate students to enroll in coursework was enacted. The following statement was included in the Graduate Bulletin. "Graduate students must be enrolled in coursework by the tenth day of class each fall and spring semester. It will be assumed graduate students who have not enrolled by the 10th day of class elected not to enroll, and they will be required to apply for readmission and responsible for all fees associated with readmission. This policy excludes eight week two (8W2) courses. However, students who fail to enroll in 8W2 courses according to the standard fee schedule remain subject to late enrollment fees."

Doctoral Diplomas to be Distributed by Registrar

Beginning this spring semester, the Graduate School will no longer distribute diplomas to doctoral graduates. Instead, the registrar's office will mail doctoral diplomas, and graduates should expect to receive them within six to eight weeks after commencement. This change in practice will allow graduate degree auditors adequate time to clear doctoral students for graduation and post degrees prior to issuing the diploma, and it will eliminate the potential for errors associated with additional handling of diplomas. This change applies to doctoral graduates on all USM campuses.

The doctoral program is comprehensive and places emphasis on teacher education, administration, research, and community services. Candidates are evaluated on productivity in these areas during the Annual Doctoral Review (with an internship required in at least one of these areas). The candidate is expected to develop competency in each of the above areas; the program will be based upon these as well asexperience, background, and information gathered from written and oral qualifying and comprehensive examinations. Individualized program plans are formalized by candidates and the graduate coordinator following the successful completion of the qualifying examinations.

The doctoral program requires a minimum of 54-69 hours past the master's degree and a residency which requires 24 semester hours to be completed during each of two consecutive semesters of fall and spring.

The doctoral program requires a minimum of 54-69 hours (plus dissertation) beyond the master's degree or 33 hours (plus dissertation) beyond the Ed.S. in Special Education from the University of Southern Mississippi. The doctoral program also requires a residency comprised of one of the following: (a) two consecutive terms of twelve (12) hours each, (b) two consecutive summer terms of twelve (12) hours each with continuous enrollment during intervening terms, (c) three consecutive terms of nine (9) hours each, or (d) four consecutive terms of six (6) hours each.

Students should consult the departmental guidelines and the Admission Requirement Procedures section and the General Academic Requirements section of this Graduate Bulletin.

Admission Requirements

Admission to doctoral programs offered in the Department of Curriculum, Instruction, and Special Education is selective. To be considered for regular admission to a doctoral degree program, an applicant must have:

a. an academic record reflecting a superior graduate grade point average;

- b. official results from the Graduate Record Examination (GRE);
- c. a writing sample consisting of a major paper, article, report, etc.
- d. a letter of intent;

e. three letters of recommendation sent to the department from professionals in the field of education who are qualified to assess the applicant's readiness for graduate study;

- f. a professional resumé; and
- g. a copy of education license.
- h. All international applicants must provide official scores Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) or IELTS score. Two copies of transcripts of all collegiate study must also be submitted.

Applicants who have successfully completed the Ed.S. in Special Education at the University of Southern Mississippi may petition for expedited admission into the doctoral program, with submission of most of the application materials above waived. Completion of the Ed.S. in Special Education does not ensure admission into the doctoral program.

Individuals who have submitted applications which qualified for admission, but who were not selected for enrollment in a given semester, are encouraged to request that their application remain active for future consideration.

Members of underrepresented groups are strongly encouraged to apply.

Admission to doctoral programs offered in the content area of curriculum, instruction, and special education is contingent on the approval of the Departmental Graduate Committee, the department chair, and the dean of the college. An applicant who fails to meet the above criteria for regular admission may be considered for conditional admission on an individual basis. Students accepted on a conditional basis MUST obtain a 3.50 GPA or better on their first nine (9) hours of specified coursework, 600 level or higher, taken while completing this 9-hour requirement. It is the responsibility of the student to inform the department chair or graduate coordinator when conditional status is to be removed; additional requirements may be specified based on the applicant's deficiencies.

All students must register for and complete the doctoral qualifying examination. Based on the outcome of the qualifiers, students may have additional coursework assigned to their plan of study. Students must have a 3.0 GPA to graduate.

Continuous Enrollment Requirement: Students must meet the requirements specified in the front section of this Bulletin for continuous enrollment.

Leave Without Pay Policy

SCOPE

This policy applies to all employees of the University including non-benefit eligible such as adjunct faculty, graduate assistants and student workers.

Policy

In no instance are leaves of absence granted automatically. All leaves of absence require a written request from the employee, approval and support of the employee's supervisor, and the final approval of the AVP of Human Resources. Medical certification may also be required from a healthcare provider, if applicable.

 \Box No leave of absence without pay in excess of one year's time will be granted to an employee.

□ Leave of absence without pay may be granted to staff employees for the following reasons:

- Necessary absences due to illness or for emergency reasons when such absences extend beyond available personal and major medical leave accruals (or the employee is not eligible for personal and/or major medical leave).
- Approved professional development in the areas of education, research, and advanced training. This reason must be justified as being "in the best interest of the University" and, therefore, be job and profession related.

Reinstatement

Leaves of absence will be granted with the assurance of reinstatement to the same or comparable position within the University unless circumstances make it clearly impractical. Personal and major medical leave time will **not** accrue during leaves of absence without pay; however, earned leave credit may be carried forward.

Employee Benefits

When on leave of absence without pay, an employee may continue to participate in certain employee benefit programs, such as the group health insurance plan. The total cost of participation in a benefit program while the employee is on leave without pay must be paid by the employee. The employee is responsible for making arrangements with University Human Resources so that benefits can continue during his or her absence. Failure to do so within 30 days will result in termination of the insurance and an inability to reestablish coverage until the next enrollment period.

Employment Requirements

Leaves of absence without pay will not be granted to any employee with less than one year's previous service with the University. A Personnel Action Form will be required on all employees beginning and returning from leave of absence without pay status. This form will re-activate the employee and place him or her back on "active" pay status.

POLYMER SCIENCE STUDENT NAMED THREE MINUTE THESIS GRAND CHAMPION

Rahul Shankar, doctoral student in Polymer Science and Engineering from Mumbai, India, captured the title Grand Champion during the finals competition of the Fourth Annual Three Minute Thesis competition on November 3. Rahul's captivating presentation, "Improving the Fuel Efficiency of Automobiles Using Thermoplastic Composite Materials," garnered top scores from a panel of distinguished judges. He earned the top prize of \$1000 and will compete regionally at the Conference of Southern Graduate Schools annual meeting in Fayetteville, Arkansas on February 24. Rahul's dissertation research is directed by Dr. Sarah Morgan. In the Runner Up position was Charles Joplin, a doctoral student in the Department of English from Pascagoula, Mississippi. His engaging oration was entitled, "I-Witness Reports: Reading the Writing Process of English War Poets." A student of Dr. Jonathan Barron, Charles walked away with a \$750 prize. Selected by the audience as the People's Choice and winning \$500 was Oindrila Paul, a microbiology doctoral

student studying with Dr. Janet Donaldson. Oindrila is from Ghaziabad, Uttar Pradesh, India. She delivered the presentation, Stress! Even the Bacteria Cannot Escape It! Also competing in the finals competition were Carson Rouse, doctoral student in Anthropology; Kristi Carnahan, master's student in Anthropology; and Elizabeth Voorhees, doctoral student in Human Capital Development. Finalist Taylor Haynes, master of fine arts student in Theatre chose not to compete in the finals. All finalists, selected during preliminary rounds of the competition on November 1 and 2, were awarded a \$250 prize. In total, 32 students participated in the competition. A key component of the Graduate School's professional development emphasis, Three Minute Thesis is generously supported by the Offices of the Provost and Vice President for Research.

EFFECTIVE GRADUATE MENTORSHIP WORKSHOP ATTENDED BY STUDENTS AND FACULTY

Twenty-nine faculty and graduate students attended the "Effective Graduate Student Mentorship Lunch and Learn Workshop" on October 27, led by eight experienced graduate faculty and moderated by the graduate dean. The program included roundtable discussions of case studies depicting realistic scenarios that might occur between a faculty mentor and their graduate students. Faculty leaders included Dr. Douglas Masterson and Dr. Brad Dufrene, USM's 2015 and 2017 Graduate Mentor of the Year, respectively, along with Dr. Mac





Alford, Dr. Lachel Story, Dr. Heather Stur, Dr. Alan Thompson, Dr. Teresa Welsh, and Dr. Kathy Yadrick. The format was designed to encourage conversation to help graduate students and faculty understand their roles and responsibilities, to discuss policies that impact decisions and conflict resolution, and to prepare the group to face the inevitable challenges that will occur during a student's progress to degree. The session provided mentorship training required for graduate faculty applications. Thanks are extended to Vanessa Molden, Special Projects Coordinator in the Graduate School for organizing the workshop.

GRADUATE RECRUITING ASSISTANCE GRANTS (GRAGS) AWARDED

The intent of the newly-establish GRAGs program is to partner with departments to assist with recruiting efforts in the form of small grants. A call for abstracts was published in early October with an application deadline of October 30. Proposal requirements included a description of the project with attention to how a diverse group of prospects would be targeted; a plan for follow-up prospect communication using Hobson's Radius; and an itemized budget. Grants supporting departmental recruiting activities were awarded to six departments for projects to be conducted during spring, summer, and fall 2018. Each funded department will submit a report on the effectiveness of the funded recruitment project at the end of the project period. In total nearly \$12,000 was awarded by the Graduate School to support departmental recruiting efforts. The following projects were funded:

• **The Department of Child and Family Studies** will use Radius to evaluate prospect interest following online advertising and face-to-face recruiting at a professional conference to inform recruiting decisions in the future.

Funds will support attendance of the National Council on Family Relations and paid advertising using internet resources such as Google, YouTube, Facebook, and Instagram.

- **The Department of Foreign Languages and Literatures** will promote the Master of Arts in Teaching Languages (MATL) at a major conference for teachers of foreign languages. They will follow up with weekly automated email communications to prospects through Radius to encourage initiation and completion of applications and rapid review and decisions by the department.
- **The School of Criminal Justice** plans to design informational flyers and high-visibility posters and to develop direct mailing strategies for targeted recruitment. They also will recruit at professional conferences using a MachForm to collect prospect data on site. Using their communication plan in Radius, prospects will be encouraged to apply. Their intent is to expand Criminal Justice applications generally, and forensic science applications specifically.
- **The Department of Psychology** aims to increase the diversity of their applicant pool. They will use a portion of the funds to establish a "Go Gold Diversity Fellowship" to enhance support for a highly-qualified, newly-admitted student. Remaining funds will be used to support "regional recruiting road trips" to HBCU's by program directors to discuss Psychology degree options offered at USM and to distribute recruitment materials and brochures. Radius will be used to maintain regular contact with prospects.
- **The Department of History** will recruit at the Phi Alpha Theta Conference, the annual meeting of the national honor society for history. They will also visit regional college and university campuses to conduct informational sessions with prospective students. Funds will also be used to support travel and development of recruitment brochures.
- The School of Leadership and Advanced Practice in the College of Nursing will target recruiting efforts for the nurse anesthesia program to north and central Mississippi to expand outreach beyond south Mississippi. Faculty will travel to strategic locations including hospitals with high-level intensive care units and colleges and universities with associate and bachelor's level nursing programs to give presentations, lead round table discussions, show videos, and distribute recruiting materials. Strategic advertising with nursing associations will also be done. Radius will be used to maintain prospect information and manage outreach.

GRADUATE COMPETITIVE TRAVEL AWARDS (GCTA) UNDER REVIEW

The inaugural GCTA competition was hugely popular. Following an application submission deadline of October 23, the Graduate School had received 37 applications from master's and doctoral students seeking funds for travel to national and international professional conferences to present their research. Applications are currently being evaluated by a committee of graduate faculty. The announcement of students to be awarded travel support should be released prior to the close of the fall semester.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT EVENTS FOR GRADUATE STUDENTS

New Graduate Student Orientation

Orientation for all graduate students beginning their programs in the spring 2018 semester is scheduled for January 11 (Hattiesburg campus) and January 12 (Gulf Park campus). New students located at GCRL and Stennis may attend either session. The orientation will provide students with information about Graduate School and university policies, resources, and support that will enhance their experience and minimize confusion about "where to go" and "what to do" when questions arise during their time at Southern Miss. Attendance is expected for all new graduate students and mandatory for all new graduate assistants. Departments should strongly encourage their new graduate students to attend. All graduate students conducting research are encouraged to participate to hone their presentation skills in a friendly environment and compete for a prize for an outstanding presentation.



Professionals in Preparation (PIP) Wrapping Up Fall Schedule

The final PIP session for fall 2017 will be held December 1 with Dr. Dave Davies, Director, School of Mass Communication and Journalism and Dr.

Mohamed Elasri, Associate Dean, College of Science & Technology, leading a panel discussion called "Publishing and Peer Review: the Humanities and the Sciences." This session will inform the twenty PIP participants, doctoral and master's students who represent a broad array of disciplines in the humanities, physical, computational, and life sciences, and social and behavioral sciences about the expectations for publishing their work in peer-reviewed journals and other publications. The fall PIP schedule has been very successful and informative including sessions on academic integrity, mentorship, Strengths Finders, responsible conduct of research, communication, and participation in Three Minute Thesis. Participants will submit an individual development plan (IDP) before the semester ends to help them evaluate possible career paths, identify professional development needs, and map out a plan to gain training and experience to achieve short and long-term professional goals. Many outstanding USM faculty and staff have led PIP sessions this semester, and the students appreciate their willingness to share their time and experiences. The spring semester will bring valuable workshops and discussions, leading off with panel discussions on interviewing for an academic job (January 26) and for a job in business/industry (February 9). A call for applications to participate in the 2018-19 PIP program will be released during the spring semester.

GRADUATE SCHOOL RECRUITING

The fall recruiting season ended in November with Carolyn Cawthon's attendance at the National Collegiate Honors Council Annual Conference held November 8-12 in Atlanta where she staffed a recruiting booth, met with many honors undergraduate students interested in graduate studies, and collected prospect information. All prospect information collected during Graduate School recruiting this fall was loaded into Radius and is available for departments to review. We encourage departments to reach out to these prospects and encourage their applications. Outreach to prospects will likely strengthen our admissions funnel, improve selectivity, and potentially grow enrollment.

GRADUATE SCHOOL POLICY/PROCEDURE UPDATES

External Employment and the Graduate Assistantship

The following policy on graduate assistant employment outside the university was approved by Graduate Council and the Provost during the fall 2017 semester. The policy is effective beginning spring 2018.

Any student holding a graduate assistantship must be enrolled as a full-time student. Therefore, any employment outside the university (external employment) is discouraged, and external full-time employment is prohibited for graduate assistants. Graduate assistants who wish to participate in external employment must obtain written permission from their major professor, graduate coordinator, and school director. The nature and extent of the external employment must be considered in granting permission. Renewal of external employment must be

requested and approved annually. If while engaging in external employment the student is unable to maintain good academic standing or fulfill the required duties of the assistantship, the graduate assistant contract may be terminated. Failure to comply with this policy will result in loss of the assistantship.

Updated Deadlines on Graduate School Website

To assist graduate students and graduate faculty in understanding the paperwork required during a student's progress to degree and corresponding deadlines, the graduate degree auditors, documents specialist, and director of operations reevaluated and redesigned the Graduate School Deadlines webpage in an attempt to clarify and simplify those requirements. The requirement and deadlines for fall 2017, spring 2018, summer 2018, and fall 2018 are now posted. Please note some revisions in deadlines were made after feedback was received from several departments following recent distribution of a draft document. Deadlines for applications for degree correspond to those posted by the registrar. Noteworthy changes from the former posted schedule include the following: 1) The "Approved Title Page" which preceded the "Final Title Page" is no longer required. The student will submit the title page only one time as "Signed Title Page," and it should be submitted via email. A paper copy is only needed if the department requires a bound copy; 2) a Commencement Program Form for doctoral students is now required to allow us to collect the information to be included in the commencement program.

*Please note Graduate School staff members **do not** contact students to remind them of upcoming graduation deadlines. It is the student's responsibility to check the Graduate School website for deadlines. We ask committee chairs or graduate coordinators to inform students of this responsibility as a part of advising.

Thesis/Dissertation/Nursing Capstone and Title Page Template Updates

A new thesis/dissertation/capstone project title page template was designed which requires original signatures only for the committee chair, department chair, and dean of the Graduate School. The purpose of the new template is to minimize a student's legwork in collecting committee member signatures on title pages especially when revisions to the document must be completed after the defense. This change will eliminate the need to mail hard copies of title pages when a committee member or the student is off site. The template should be used for documents submitted for graduation in spring 2018 and later. Students who have already submitted a signed title page need not submit a new title page.

Most style guides suggest the use of Times New Roman as the appropriate font for formal documents. Therefore, the Graduate School is discontinuing Arial font templates as an option for constructing thesis, dissertation, and nursing capstone projects. Five Times New Roman templates are available on the Graduate School website for students to choose from depending upon field of study.

Graduate Faculty Appointment Criteria Webpage Update

These recommendations are intended to provide departments more flexibility in receiving and accepting applications. Please note that if your program is not interested in allowing more flexibility with your deadlines, that is fine, however, the Graduate School will still need to be contacted when you are ready to have your application removed from the portal.

The Department of Human Capital Development faculty request approval of a revised plan of study for the Human Capital Development (HCD) doctoral program.

The HCD faculty approved the inclusion of a pre-proposal course, HCD 891, *Research in HCD*, as a required research course for all HCD doctoral students. HCD 891 will include the completion of the preproposal, as well as the written comprehensive examination. HCD 891 is a 3-hour course to provide students with instruction, coaching, and comprehensive feedback to develop a dissertation proposal. With the addition of HCD 891 as a required course, the number of required dissertation hours (HCD 898) will be reduced from 12 hours to 9 hours, resulting in no change in the overall number of hours required for the HCD PhD program.

EXTERNAL EMPLOYMENT AND THE GRADUATE ASSISTANTSHIP

Any student holding a graduate assistantship must be enrolled as a full-time student. Therefore, any employment outside the university (external employment) is discouraged, and external full-time employment is prohibited for graduate assistants. Graduate assistants who wish to participate in external employment must obtain written permission from their major professor, graduate coordinator, and school director. The nature and external employment must be requested and approved annually. If, while engaging in external employment the student is unable to maintain good academic standing or fulfill the required duties of the assistantship, the graduate assistant contract may be terminated. Failure to comply with this policy will result in loss of the assistantship.

Q: What is a "Consent Agenda" and how will it make our meetings go faster?

At every board meeting, at least a few items come to the agenda that do not need any discussion or debate either because they are routine procedures or are already unanimous consent. A consent agenda (Roberts Rules of Order calls it a consent calendar) allows the board to approve all these items together without discussion or individual motions. Depending upon the organization, this can free up anywhere from a few minutes to a half hour for more substantial discussion.

What belongs on the consent agenda?

Typical consent agenda items are routine, procedural decisions, and decisions that are likely to be noncontroversial. Examples include:

- Approval of the minutes;
- Final approval of proposals or reports that the board has been dealing with for some time and all members are familiar with the implications;
- Routine matters such as appointments to committees;
- Staff appointments requiring board confirmation;
- Reports provided for information only;
- Correspondence requiring no action.

How are items on a consent agenda handled?

A consent agenda can only work if the reports and other matters for the meeting agenda are known in advance and distributed with agenda package in sufficient time to be read by all members prior to the meeting. A typical procedure is as follows:

- 1. When preparing the meeting agenda, the president or chairperson determines whether an item belongs on the consent agenda.
- 2. The president prepares a numbered list of the consent items as part of, or as an attachment to the meeting agenda.
- 3. The list and supporting documents are included in the board's agenda package in sufficient time to be read by all members prior to the meeting.
- 4. At the beginning of the meeting, the chair asks members what items they wish to be removed from the consent agenda and discussed individually.
- 5. If any member requests that an item be removed from the consent agenda, it must be removed. Members may request that an item be removed for any reason. They may wish, for example, to discuss the item, to query the item, or to register a vote against the item.
- 6. Once it has been removed, the chair can decide whether to take up the matter immediately or place it on the regular meeting agenda.
- 7. When there are no more items to be removed, the chair or secretary reads out the numbers of the remaining consent items. Then the chair states: "If there is no objection, these items will be adopted." After pausing for any objections, the chair states "As there are no objections, these items are adopted." It is not necessary to ask for a show of hands.
- 8. When preparing the minutes, the Secretary includes the full text of the resolutions, reports or recommendations that were adopted as part of the consent agenda.

How to start using a consent agenda

In order to start using a consent agenda, the board should first adopt a rule of order allowing for the consent agenda process. A sample rule is:

"A consent agenda may be presented by the president at the beginning of a meeting. Items may be removed from the consent agenda on the request of any one member. Items not removed may be adopted by general consent without debate. Removed items may be taken up either immediately after the consent agenda or placed later on the agenda at the discretion of the assembly.

It is important to make sure that all directors know what items belong on the agenda and how to move items to and from the consent agenda. For this reason, instruction on using the consent agenda should be part of the board orientation program.

Subject: Professional Education Council Approval Procedure

Based on my authority as chair of the Professional Education Council (PEC), and following discussion and consultation with the Executive Committee for PEC in the College of Education and Psychology, I would like to propose the following alterations to the PEC.

First, all proposals submitted to the PEC would henceforth be required to only have a single read. A second read will no longer be required of proposals. PEC would still have the option to table a proposal should additional reads be necessary.

Second, we propose coordinating PEC meetings with those of the Academic and Graduate Councils to expedite the proposal review and approval process. Proposals that involve licensure programs and originate from College curriculum bodies will be forwarded directly to the respective Council (Academic or Graduate), from which they will be referred to the PEC for review prior to the subsequent Council meeting. As a matter of procedure, Debbie Stoulig, has worked with Academic Council and PEC to facilitate these changes to the master calendar.

All changes have been ratified by PEC, and we are prepared for immediate implementation.

MCNAIR SCHOLARS PROGRAM FUNDED!

Congratulations to Carolyn Cawthon, Director of USM's McNair Scholars Program, and the entire McNair team on their successful application for program renewal from the U.S. **Department of Education.** Funded for 5 years at a total of \$1.16 M, the program supports academic and research opportunities for first generation/low income and underrepresented undergraduate students. The program aims to equip Scholars for the challenges of graduate school with an eye toward their earning a doctorate. The McNair Program, first established in 2000 and serving nearly 425 students over 17 years, is administered in the Graduate School.



McNair Scholars visited Gulf Park, Stennis, and GCRL to experience research activities on those campuses during summer 2017 activities.

ANNOUNCING THE GRADUATE COMPETITIVE TRAVEL AWARDS (GCTA) PROGRAM

The Dean of the Graduate School and the Vice President for Research are happy to announce the jointly-sponsored Graduate Competitive Travel Awards (GCTA) program to assist graduate student travel to conferences, exhibitions, or other scholarly meetings to present original research or exhibit creative works. Beginning academic year 2017-18 with an annual budget of \$20,000, GCTA will

support travel to high impact, national or international meetings. Matching funds from departments or colleges will be expected. A call for proposals with instructions will be issued twice during the academic year, in early October 2017 (for spring and summer 2018 travel) and in late summer 2018 (for fall 2018 travel). Requests will be limited to \$500 for domestic travel and \$1000 for international travel. Eligible applicants must be regular-status, continuing master's, specialist, or doctoral students in good academic standing. The applicant must be enrolled during the semester the application is submitted and during the semester of travel (excluding summer). A funded student cannot receive the award if he/she graduates prior to the dates of travel. A student is limited to one application per funding period and may receive only one travel award per academic year. Proposals will be reviewed and funding decisions made by a faculty committee. More information and a call for proposals will be available on the Graduate School website in late September.

ANNOUNCING GRADUATE RECRUITING ASSISTANCE GRANTS FOR SCHOOLS AND DEPARTMENTS

The Graduate School is allocating up to \$20,000 per year to assist schools and departments with recruiting efforts through the Graduate Recruiting Assistance Grants (GRAGs) program. Schools and departments may request up to \$2000 per year through a competitive grants program to support recruiting efforts. Successful applications will describe the proposed recruiting activity, the potential for the activity to engage a diverse population of high-quality prospects, and a prospect outreach plan (using Radius) to encourage submitted applications and enrollment of admitted applicants. At the end of one year, a brief quantitative report on the effectiveness of the project will be required. Applications must be submitted through the department chair or school director. Only one application per school or department will be accepted. A call for GRAGs proposals will be available on the Graduate School website in early October. Applications will be due in early November.

Effective Graduate Student Mentorship Lunch and Learn Workshop Coming in October

Faculty and advanced graduate students are invited to learn how to manage real life challenges faced by mentors and mentees at the fall 2017 Effective Graduate Student Mentorship Lunch and Learn Workshop to be held Friday, October 27 from noon – 2 pm in the Union Hall of Honors. Faculty and students will join experienced graduate faculty for a meal and roundtable discussions of case studies describing realistic problems that may arise during a student's degree program. This workshop may be used to fulfill the graduate mentorship training requirement for graduate faculty status.

GRADUATE SCHOOL POLICY AND PROCEDURE UPDATES

Degree Progress Reports Replace Plans of Study Forms for Newly-admitted Graduate Students

Effective for all fall 2017 newly-admitted graduate students and continuing forward, the Graduate School is utilizing degree progress reports (DPR's) to monitor progress to degree. Graduate degree auditors will not accept Plan of Study (POS) forms from these students. As the DPR's had to be built with an effective start date, students admitted prior to fall 2017 will continue to use POS forms through graduation, even if granted an extension to their time limit. Any coursework taken by any student (including fall 2017 admits) prior to January 1, 2015 will not be populated on the DPR. The Graduate School is no longer maintainaining updates to POS forms on the website, and they will be removed from the website at the end of the fall 2017 semester. Continuing students enrolled prior to fall 2017 must submit POS forms to their degree auditor for preliminary and final degree audits, so departments should maintain updated POS forms for distribution to those students. The graduate DPR works identically to the undergraduate DPR which many faculty are familiar with using. If faculty are unfamiliar with DPRs and have questions, need assistance, or would like to be trained on how to use the DPR, they should contact Tracy Barnhill.

Approval Form for Dissertations, Nursing Capstone, and Theses Proposals Modified to Include Regulatory Compliance Statements

A student performing research involving human subjects or live vertebrates must obtain approval from the Institutional Review Board (IRB) or the Institutional Animal Care and Use Committee (IACUC), respectively, prior to beginning the project. To ensure IRB or IACUC approval has been received, if applicable, the proposal (prospectus) approval form now requires acknowledgement of the regulatory compliance review and a copy of the letter of approval from the IRB or IACUC. As it did before, the form requires signatures of the committee chair, committee members, department chair, and student.
