Each student will be able to demonstrate courageous curiosity. The Curiosity Pillar involves the ability to ask big questions and learn about the world through their experiences. Curious students will examine their learning processes, engage in thought-provoking activities, consider unfamiliar ideas, and critically reflect on behaviors and actions. Students will experiment through supported intellectual risks, integrate knowledge across contexts, and value learning as an active pursuit.
